• Elections for Board of Directors (Please Read)

We are currently accepting submissions for the ABORM Board of Directors. To qualify you must be a current Fellow of the ABORM. There are 4 positions on the Board to be filled - each for a term of two (2) years. Please be aware that these are working positions and you will be expected to attend the annual meetings, hold committee positions, conduct work on behalf of the ABORM, and attend national conferences.

If you are interested in becoming a member of the ABORM Board of Directors please submit a short bio to Dana Price at danaprice@iluminahealing.com. The deadline for submission is December 15th, 2008. This is a great opportunity to make a difference in our profession and in the ABORM.

Elections will take place by Internet voting. Once we receive all of the candidates names and bio's we will compile them and send them to all ABORM fellows to vote on. All Internet votes must be received by January 15, 2009 to be counted. Once all votes are counted we will announce the new Board members via e-mail. The electees will officially start their tenure at the ABORM annual meeting on April 22nd, 2009, which will take place immediately following the ABORM examination. This annual Board Meeting is mandatory, so please do not submit your name for consideration as a Director unless you can definitely attend this meeting. Plan on arriving on Tuesday, April 21st, in order to help

administer the ABORM Examination which begins with Registration at 7:30 AM on Wednesday morning, April 22, for a 9:00 Examination start time.

Fellow Profile

Lee Hullender, MS, LAc, FABORM

After a ten-year stint in the Air Force that led to station assignments in Germany, Saudi Arabia, and South Korea, Lee Hullender was ready for a career change. In 1998, two years after her introduction to acupuncture while stationed in Korea, she began her training with a deep interest in women's reproductive health.

Since finishing her Master's degree at Bastyr University in 2001, Lee has developed her reproductive medicine specialty through mentorship, study, and practice. In 2005, Lee started an independent clinic, Abundant Spring LLC. She now splits her time between the Northwest Center for Reproductive Sciences, a biomedical fertility center and her clinic. Her practice coordinates and provides team coverage to couples seeking acupuncture treatment on the day of their embryo transfer seven days a week. Lee has also begun teaching at the Jade Institute with Cindy Micleu, LAc. They recently completed a 42-hour comprehensive course on the treatment of infertility that included current research, male factor, environmental issues, and nutrition.

Research is of keen interest to Lee, especially that which accurately reflects clinical practice and is considered ecologically valid. She is currently involved with a research project co-authoring the full manuscript of the Craig et al abstract (Acupuncture lowers pregnancy rates when performed before and after embryo transfer, 2007). A controversial and unfortunate outcome, Lee hopes this research study will help strengthen the argument for more ecologically valid research design in the future. While IVF and standardized acupuncture studies (Paulus et al, 2002) (Dieterle et al, 2006) (Westergaard et al, 2006) have been very beneficial to the field, they were not accurate reflections of clinical practice and applied few standardized acupuncture treatments.

As a result, Lee has been tracking patient reproductive outcomes since

2005. The data includes patients who were receiving traditional Chinese medicine treatment while trying to conceive naturally or undergoing biomedical treatment such as IVF. As her database grew, she began to notice trends. These trends were the impetus to beginning the doctoral program in Portland, Ore., in 2007. Lee's capstone will organize this data and retrospectively analyze approximately 350 in vitro fertilization (IVF) patient outcomes collected over three years and report her findings. Preliminary analysis looks promising.
